PROGRAMS FOR YOUTH

Do Jewish youth know what to do when:

- THEY HEAR NAZI TAUNTS?

- THEY SEE ANTISEMITIC TROPES, CARICATURES, AND STEREOTYPES ONLINE?

Elementary, middle, and high school youth will actively:

- Identify and discuss the challenges and problems
- Learn how to create a team with parents and trusted adults
- Gain understanding of and rehearse assertive body language & calming
- Roleplay scenarios to safely apply and practice effective strategies

At the JCC, Lynne and Harlene led 30 Teen Travel campers in small groups (assisted by six local volunteer educators) in a thorough and interactive program of learning how to push back safely against antisemitism. Explored were: assertive posture, what-to-do strategies, calming, and working with family as a team. The program ended with the teens role-playing scenarios designed to reinforce the what-to-do safe strategies in an antisemitic situation. Our 12-14 year-old campers got so much from this program that we'll not only be repeating it every summer but will also offer a version to younger campers.
